



ACCC TAKES ACTION AGAINST BIRUBI IN COURACCC ACTION OVER T"ABORIGINAL" FOR ALLEGED MISLEADING INDIGENOUS ART ART PRODUCTS CLAIMS

The ACCC has instituted proceedings in the taken Federal Court action against national Aboriginal art products and Australiana souvenirs wholesaler Birubi Art Pty Ltd (Birubi), alleging it misled people about some of its products including where they were made, and their nature and history.

"The Birubi's alleged conduct is of serious concern, is damaging as it misleads people who think they are buying genuine hand made Aboriginal art. This It also as it not only harms consumers who may be misled, but it also has the potential to undermine the integrity of Aboriginal art, and negatively impact Indigenous artists, including potentially undervaluing authentic Indigenous Australian artwork, and their artwork has be paid for their works," ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard Chairman Rod Sims said.

The products at the centre of the ACCC's allegations include Aberiginal cultural objects such as becomerange, bullrearers, and didgeridess. The products displayed a combination of words and artwork including 'hand pointed', 'handerafted', 'Aberiginal Art', and 'Australia'.

"We allege that over 18,000 of these products were sold to shops in key tourist spots around the country throughout Australia. In the lead up to the Commonwealth Games in Australia next month, which will see tens of thousands of tourists visiting Australia, it's particularly important to ensure products being sold as purporting to be Indigenous cultural objects or art are authentic.," Ms Rickard said. ACCC Chairman Red Sime said.
