Hi Grace

Sorry for delay.

The ACCC conducts investigations when we have a reason to believe misleading claims are being made about products or art being produced by Indigenous Australians when they are not. This work is important to the ACCC because misleading claims have the potential to undermine the integrity of Indigenous art and negatively impact Indigenous artists, including by undervaluing or trivialising their authentic works. People who buy handmade Indigenous art or products should also have the assurance that the claims being made are genuine.

The ACCC is able to address two types of misleading conduct involving both express and implied representations. Express representations may include a label or a statement by the seller direct to the consumer stating that it is authentic Indigenous art. Implied representations may arise when the product is painted in a traditional Indigenous style, contains some form of representation as to 'hand painted' or 'hand crafted' or reference to Indigenous Australia, but has no information as to its true country of origin.

The ACCC has a history of action in this area. Recently, we investigated several allegations of such conduct referred to us under the Indigenous Art Code and took court action against one trader. That matter is before the court. We are currently investigating further allegations and may take further action this year.

Enforcing the consumer law in relation to issues like these that negatively impact Indigenous Australians is an enduring priority for the ACCC. We hope our continued vigilance in this area will send a strong deterrent message to other traders who seek to mislead or deceive.
